



## Joint Statement from the Chairman of the Board and the President & CEO

The year of 2011 has been very successful for Houston Hospice.

Significant progress was achieved in all of our key strategic areas. We continue to operate more effectively while growing the number of patients served. This improved operational performance has led to improved financial performance as well.

In response to this growth we are adding physicians, staff and facilities. We are developing a strategy to increase our capabilities to provide hospice inpatient care. We have been evaluating the feasibility of expanding our inpatient unit located in the Texas Medical Center as well as partnerships with other facilities in areas that will allow us to increase our capacity and provide more accessible inpatient care throughout our service area.

When the Margaret Cullen Marshall Center, our inpatient unit, located at our Texas Medical Center site, was originally constructed, two of the building's three floors were completed leaving the third floor for future expansion. Our plan is to complete this floor which will allow us to bring an additional 13 beds into service on this campus. Another planned

enhancement at the Texas Medical Center site will be the restoration of the garden to its original state when the grounds were occupied by Mayor Oscar Holcombe and his family in the 1920's. The Garden Club of Houston, who for many years has provided expertise and resources to Houston Hospice for its gardens, will be overseeing this project.

We continue to be a teaching and learning organization. During 2011 Houston Hospice served as a rotation for numerous medical students, physician fellows and residents and nursing students. Houston Hospice became accredited as a provider of physician CME's (continuing medical education) and nursing CEU's (continuing education units). In 2011, we focused on telling the Houston Hospice story. Numerous presentations about hospice care and Houston

Hospice were given to organizations throughout our communities. We have enhanced our web site and begun using social media.

As the hospice industry works toward establishing standard quality measurements for hospice care, Houston Hospice has

maintained its attention to quality and customer

service. Our key quality and service data can be found on our web site.

In 2011 we received generous grants from foundations, gifts from individuals and we had two very successful fundraising events. In April, the Butterfly Luncheon featured Jeffrey Zaslow, co-author of *The Last Lecture*. In October the 13th Annual Laura Lee Blanton Community Spirit Award Dinner honoring Maureen and Jim Hackett for their outstanding service and philanthropy was held. The 2011 year was an exciting year for Houston Hospice. We look forward to meeting the challenges and achieving our goals going forward. We continue to believe that our best years are ahead. ## A Tribute to Dixie by Ann James, Volunteer

Since 2006, when golden retrievers, “Dixie and Chrissy” became the first certified therapy dogs to join the Houston Hospice volunteer program, the two canine best friends have made regular visits to the Patient Care Center to brighten the days of patients, families and staff members. While Chrissy (eight years Dixie's junior) had the soulful eyes, it was Dixie's smile, pronounced by her whitening muzzle that could turn anyone's frown upside down.

Dixie knew no strangers; she loved everyone. Even those who were not particularly fond of dogs couldn't refrain from petting her. She was a people-magnet, whether walking the halls of the center or strolling in the serene adjacent gardens. Without a single word, her

gentleness and wagging tail conveyed to those who crossed her path that she sensed their pain, and everything was going to be alright.

This past November, at almost 18 years of age, Dixie with minimal eyesight and total hearing loss enthusiastically made what would be her last visit to the patient care center giving of herself selflessly as she always did to those going through difficult times. One family member defined her presence best when he said, “Thank you, Dixie for giving me my only reason to smile today.”

Much like most of our hospice patients, Dixie died at home two weeks after her last visit – very peacefully, on her own terms and surrounded by her loved ones.

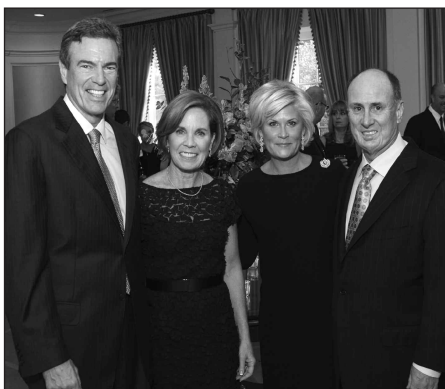

# Great Day Houston

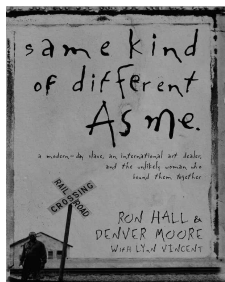
